Little Stitches, Big Thread Workshop

Create glorious texture by using small stitches to enhance simple patchwork. Bring a sewn project or start with a wholecloth quilt sandwich. We'll cover the basting process, design selection, tying knots, thread conditioners, how to start/finish each line of stitches, and how to work efficiently to maintain excitement and progress. By the end of the workshop, you'll be on your way to filling the various spaces in your quilt with simple quilting stitches.


MATERIAL LIST

- A pre sewn quilt top with seams thoroughly pressed and ready for quilt basting
- A quilt back that is 4 inches larger on all sides than the top
- Batting* that is 2 inches larger on all sides than the top
- Suggestions for the quilt top include:
 - Sewing charm squares into a grid
 - Sewing half square triangles from charm squares
 - Sewing strips from a jelly roll
 - Final size is up to you. The example finishes at 27" square and uses half square triangles that are approximately 3" square.
- Solids will allow your stitches to be more visible, but use whatever material you would like to use.
- Safety pins for basting (to assist as we thread baste), one pin for every 5 square inches of your quilt top.
- Favorite thimble (my favorite is included in the kit, but you may prefer to use your own)
- 8 wt thread (some will be included in the kit, but you may prefer to select and bring your own colors).

*I have hand quilted with cotton, bamboo, and wool batting. I have not discovered tremendous differences in the ease of quilting, but the effects will be slightly different depending on the material selected (wool has more loft and will likely be poofier. I recommend cotton or bamboo for our purposes, but polyester is also acceptable.
